Scope

Property introduces students to foundational legal doctrines that govern how people may possess, own, share, transfer, and otherwise use "things." The course begins with a study of the means of acquiring real, physical, and intangible property and the legal rights and duties that attach to ownership. The course then explores the system of estates and future interests. It continues with various types of co-ownership, marital interests, and landlord-tenant law. The course then explores the stages of the land sale transaction, including contracts of sale; the statute of frauds; marketable title; risk of loss and equitable conversion; mortgage financing; interpretation of deeds; foreclosure; methods of title assurance; and the recording system. The course concludes by examining private land use arrangements, including easements, covenants, servitudes, and zoning.

This course is required for graduation.
